Hearing Device Candidacy

To determine candidacy for a hearing aid, a comprehensive hearing evaluation must be completed. Once the need for amplification is established, the audiologist will consult with the client to determine the most appropriate hearing device for his or her needs. Although hearing aids will not restore normal hearing, they do provide significant hearing assistance. Benefit from amplification is best when hearing loss is identified early.

Through the support of the Scottish Rite Foundation, services to enhance communicative interactions of children with delays or disorders of communication are available to families with identified needs.



Auditory-Verbal Therapy



Auditory-Verbal therapy is provided for children with hearing loss whose families choose this approach and want their child to learn to listen and talk. A family member or caregiver actively participates in every therapy session as they learn to become their child's primary language facilitator.
